It means the status of a certificate







Adding a New Category – 61.63(b)

(b) *Additional aircraft category rating.* A person who applies to add a category <u>rating</u> to a pilot certificate:

(1) Must complete the training and have the applicable aeronautical experience.

(2) Must have a logbook or training record endorsement from an <u>authorized instructor</u> attesting that the <u>person</u> was found competent in the appropriate aeronautical knowledge areas and proficient in the appropriate areas of operation.

(3) Must pass the practical test.

(4) Need not take an additional knowledge test, provided the applicant holds an airplane, rotorcraft, powered-lift, weight-shift-control aircraft, powered parachute, or airship rating at that pilot certificate level.

Must have instruction in the aeronautical knowledge and flight proficiency areas of the Subpart



Adding a New Category – 61.63(b) – KEY POINTS

Must meet the Aeronautical Experience Requirements



Adding a New Category – 61.63(b) – KEY POINTS

Can credit appropriate time in other categories/classes



Adding a New Category – 61.63(b) – KEY POINTS

No Knowledge test if going from: Power-Power Power-No Power



Adding a New Category – 61.63(b) – KEY POINTS

No Power-Power requires a knowledge test

61.129(a)(3)(i) – Defines the items



Adding an Additional Class Rating

(c) *Additional aircraft class rating.* A <u>person</u> who applies for an additional class <u>rating</u> on a pilot certificate:

(1) Must have a logbook or training record endorsement from an <u>authorized instructor</u> attesting that the <u>person</u> was found competent in the appropriate aeronautical knowledge areas and proficient in the appropriate areas of operation.

(2) Must pass the practical test.

(3) Need not meet the specified <u>training time</u> requirements prescribed by this part that apply to the pilot certificate for the <u>aircraft</u> class <u>rating</u> sought; unless, the <u>person</u> only holds a lighter-than-air category <u>rating</u> with a <u>balloon</u> class <u>rating</u> and is seeking an <u>airship</u> class <u>rating</u>, then that <u>person</u> must receive the specified <u>training time</u> requirements and possess the appropriate aeronautical experience.

(4) Need not take an additional <u>knowledge test</u>, provided the applicant holds an <u>airplane</u>, <u>rotorcraft</u>, <u>powered-lift</u>, <u>weight-shift-control aircraft</u>, <u>powered parachute</u>, or airship rating at that pilot certificate level.



Adding an Additional Class Rating – KEY POINTS

Must receive training in the aeronautical knowledge and flight proficiency areas of the Subpart



Adding an Additional Class Rating – KEY POINTS

Need NOT meet the aeronautical experience requirements



Adding an Additional Class Rating – KEY POINTS

No Knowledge Test if: Power-Power Power-No Power



Adding an Additional Class Rating – KEY POINTS

No Aeronautical Experience Requirements means: No 3 hours in preparation for the practical test



Adding an Additional Class Rating – KEY POINTS

Proficiency is what is required



Endorsements – Not Private, Rec, Commercial

A.74 Additional aircraft category or class rating (other than ATP): § 61.63(b) or (c).

I certify that [First name, MI, Last name], [grade of pilot certificate], [certificate number], has received the required training for an additional [aircraft category/class rating]. I have determined that they are prepared for the [name of] practical test for the addition of a [name of specific aircraft category/class/type] type rating.



Endorsements – Not Private, Rec, Commercial

PREREQUISITES FOR THE PRACTICAL TEST ENDORSEMENT

A.1 Prerequisites for practical test: § <u>61.39(a)(6)(i)</u> and (ii).

I certify that [First name, MI, Last name] has received and logged training time within 2 calendar months preceding the month of application in preparation for the practical test and they are prepared for the required practical test for the issuance of [applicable] certificate.

A.2 Review of deficiencies identified on airman knowledge test: § 61.39(a)(6)(iii), as required.

I certify that [First name, MI, Last name] has demonstrated satisfactory knowledge of the subject areas in which they were deficient on the [applicable] airman knowledge test.



Endorsements – What about PIC Time in an airplane?

61.31(d)(1) – You must be rated in the aircraft



Endorsements – What about PIC Time in an airplane?

That means it appears on your pilot certificate or Logbook if Sport Pilot



Endorsements – What about PIC Time in an airplane?

If no airplane rating cat/class then NO pic time unless SOLO – Not during Dual Flights – 61.51(e)



Endorsements – What about PIC Time in an airplane?

The pilot is NOT a Student Pilot



Endorsements – What about PIC Time in an airplane?

The entire Student Pilot Subpart doesn't apply!



Endorsements – What about PIC Time in an airplane?

61.31(d)(2) – Allows for a solo endorsement



Endorsements – What about PIC Time in an airplane?

A.72 To act as PIC of an aircraft in solo operations when the pilot does not hold an appropriate category/class rating: § 61.31(d)(2).

I certify that [First name, MI, Last name] has received the training as required by § 61.31(d)(2) to serve as a pilot in command in a [specific category and class] of aircraft. I have determined that they are prepared to solo that [M/M] aircraft. Limitations: [optional].





Redbird Releases the "State of Flight Training" Survey

The State Of Flight Training Annual Redbird Study Released Cost For Private Ticket Averages \$14,000

Redbird Simulations has unveiled its <u>5th annual State of Flight Training</u> <u>Survey</u> which shows the median cost for a pilot certificate or rating in 2023 was \$14,000, compared to \$9,000 in 2020. The yearly effort analyzes trends, priorities, strengths and challenges to build a better aviation future. Last year's survey found that new pilots take fewer weeks to earn certificates, but spend more. The report noted that average students are taking only 24 weeks to earn a certificate in 2023, compared to 30 weeks in 2020.

The survey showed average costs for ratings in 2023 were:

- \$10,500 for Sport Pilot.
- \$14,000 for Private Pilot
- \$12,000 for Instrument Rating
- \$15,000 for a Commercial Certificate single-engine
- \$6,000 for initial CFI.


